Season of Creation (1 September – 4 October)

This week is Catholic Week for the Environment (16 – 23 September). The Pope with his encyclical *Laudato si' – Praise be to you* is leading the way with his calls on every person to care for creation. However, the encyclical is more than just care for the environment. It is about human ecology and calls for fair sharing of resources and talents.

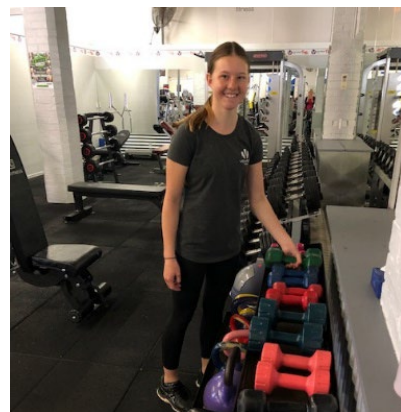
Year 11 and Year 12 Subject Selection 2020

10C Work Experience

All our Year 10 students have now undertaken a work experience placement. This has been a fantastic effort from students, their families and of course employers. We think our program has been hugely successful this year and are starting to encourage current Year 9 students to start planning for their placements in 2020!!!

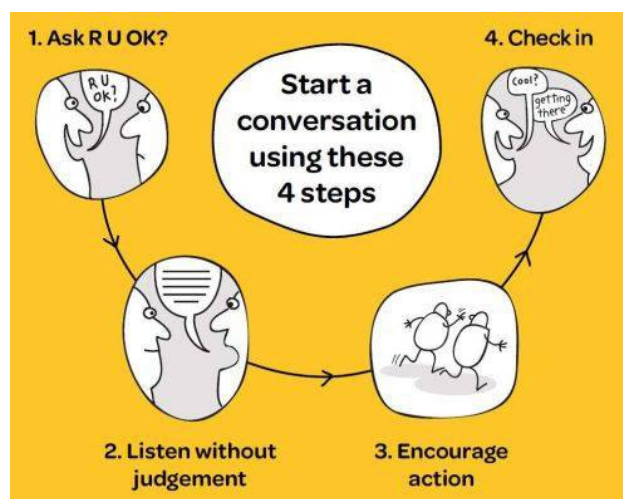
R U OK? DAY

Be aware of certain behaviours and signs that can indicate a child might be struggling. The first thing to look out for is changes in behaviour. When people feel low, they often:

- withdraw from their family or their friends
- lash out at people and get angry or upset really easily, including towards the people they care about
- cry or become emotional
- lose interest in activities and things they usually love
- have changed sleeping patterns. They might be sleeping all the time, not sleeping much at all, or sleeping at strange hours (such as in the middle of the day)
- have a changed appetite. They could be eating more than usual, or less.

If you suspect your child is not ok or they tell you 'no, I'm not ok,' contact the school and see your GP.

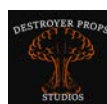
