Summer Learning

This week we have experienced a spike in temperatures and I am sure there is more hot weather to come our way. This can have an impact on student engagement, attitudes, temperament and participation. Research tells us that when temperatures are too hot (or indeed when they are too cold) our brain constantly reminds our body to try to do something about it and because of that, focus can be difficult. There are however a few things that we can do to ensure we can still be learning on a hot day.

- 1. Control the temperature as much as possible. All our classrooms have air conditioning aren't we lucky!
- 2. At break times, make sure you are wearing your hat when you are in the sun and sitting in the shade when you can.
- 3. Utilise the hot weather rooms that are open at lunchtime and are air conditioned!
- 4. Stay hydrated! Bring a bottle of water to school and into class.

Summer Uniform

- Hats must be carried at both recess and lunch and should be worn in the sun.

The vast majority of our students do wear their uniform really well and this is wonderful. It is disappointing when others opt out.

We are very privileged to have so many opportunities to represent our school. Students are regularly going out into the community to participate in excursions, to play sport, to join groups, to enter competitions, to attend workshops and lectures and to act as representatives of our student body. This is wonderful for our school community, provides great support in our town and also has many benefits for students. Students are expected always to maintain high standards of presentation and behaviour, both at school and when they are on activities. These are solid guidelines for life in society and don't need to be left at the gate when we leave the school grounds. Students should always ensure that they conduct themselves with pride and respect.

WORLD CHALLENGE CAMBODIA

On Thursday 10th October Grace Farrell, Bella Howison, Hannah Storer, Olivia Closter, Alex Hall, Mr Joyce and Mrs Howison set off to Melbourne to begin our World Challenge experience. We were able to meet the 8 other challengers from Canberra College and our World Challenge Leader Laura at the airport. We participated in some quick get to know each other games before boarding an 8-hour flight to Singapore, then our next flight which took us to Cambodia's capital city, Phnom Penh.

Sleep-deprived, we split into our leadership groups and made our way to our first night's accommodation, spending the rest of the day taking it easy and exploring around the city. While in Phnom Penh we visited the Killing Fields and S21, learning about the Khmer Rouge regime, which impacts the country to this day. We were able to participate in a respectful travelling workshop and got to watch Liv be the first in the group to eat a spider.

After Phnom Penh, we headed down to the coast to spend a few relaxing days in Kampot. We went to the beach in Kep and wandered around local markets trying out fresh octopus and crabs.

From Kampot, we went on an 8-hour bus ride that actually took 12 hours, arriving in Banlung for one night. Here we met our trek guides and set off into the Ratanakiri jungle. Here we spent the next 4 days hiking through the jungle with our packs, completing around 7km each day. We were constantly flicking off leeches and sweating profusely as we pushed through the challenging hike. We slept in hammocks each night at our different camps which were located near beautiful waterfalls that acted as great showers.





After our trek, we returned to Banlung for some well-needed sleep. We spent the next two days exploring Banlung before heading to Kratie. This was the base of the Cambodian Rural Development Fund who organised our community project. We took boats to Koh Dambong, a small island on the Mekong river. Upon arrival, we were warmly welcomed by our wonderful host mums and the families of the island. We spent our first-day having fun with the children on the island, who taught us many handshakes and games to keep us entertained. The next day we had a Khmer lesson, as not one person on the island could speak English. We learnt how to count, and say simple phrases to make communicating a little bit easier. Then we started our project which was to build a toilet for the school on the island. We worked for five hours each day doing jobs such as mixing cement, carrying sand, or constructing the building while Joyco dug his two-metre deep hole. After three days of work, our toilet was complete and we said our goodbyes to the island.

After our Community project, we got in yet another bus and made our way to our final destination, Siem Reap. We spent our last 2 days in the country shopping through the markets and relaxing. We were able to visit the Angkor Wat temples waking up at 4 am to see the sunrise. We also visited the Bayon temple and Ta Prohm temple where 'Tomb Raider' was filmed. On our last night, we organised to visit the Phare Circus and watched in awe throughout the performance. The Phare Circus was founded in 1994 by nine young Cambodian men returning home from a refugee camp after the fall of the Khmer Rouge. At the camp they took drawing classes and found art to be a powerful tool for healing. When they returned home they began offering free drawing classes to street children. Soon they opened a school, eventually offering formal K-12 education and professional arts



training in the areas of visual arts theatre, music, dance, and circus. It was amazing!

WORLD CHALLENGE CAMBODIA

After a long 3 weeks, it was finally time to return back to Australia. We headed to the Siem Reap airport and made our way back home. Arriving in Melbourne on Friday morning, we said our goodbyes to the Canberra College and our expedition leader Laura. Our journey had come to an end and we were on our way back to Swan Hill.

We would like to thank Mrs Howison and Mr Joyce for coming along with us and highly recommend this trip to anyone else who may be interested in exploring another country.


















SWAN HILL ART GALLERY PRESENTS - BIG FISH 4


Otto ran the 400m in the impressive time of 57.92sec (less than a second behind 3rd place) and Jordi launched the shot put 12.28m.
