FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

Good lines of communication

We appreciate being able to contact parents quickly whether it is to inform them about an excursion or to call them to collect an unwell child. More than ever, good communication is important and we encourage parents to continue to be attentive to protocols.

Please contact your child through the school. If you call the school, you can choose the connection straight through to Pastoral Care. We discourage students texting their parents and would appreciate that parents also use the school channels to make contact. This simply means that we are also aware of arrangements.

If your child is going to be absent, please advise the school first thing in the morning. This can avoid confusion and unnecessary SMS messages.

CareMonkey notifications are regularly sent out and this method of communication is very efficient. Please regularly check your notifications. The information for any event or excursion will be included in the CareMonkey so it is always available to you.

Homeroom Teachers play a significant role in providing communication channels between the parent, child and school. If, for any reason, you have concerns about the academic or social and emotional wellbeing of your child, please do not hesitate to contact your child's Homeroom Teacher (HRT). Phone calls are a good way and if unavailable the HRT can get back to you. Email is also a method of communication that often suits parents and teachers and within the email a good time for a phone call or fact to face conversation can be established.

Student Forum

This week our Student Forum were to present to our school on the activities and projects that they have established so far this year. We will hold that over to another time. Please be assured that they continue to meet and will plan for initiatives that promote engagement and connection in our school community.

MacBooks

As a school we have made a decision that our Year 7 and 8 students will be able to keep their MacBooks over the holidays. We do not have certainty about school closures at the moment and MacBooks will be one way that students can stay in touch with their learning. Parents have a great deal of influence in the way students can use technology effectively. During any time but especially the holiday period, we encourage parents to discuss with their children the best use of technology, possibly putting in place guidelines for use including some agreement about screen time. The device is issued to the student on a lease arrangement and google accounts are managed by the school. It is therefore important that the MacBook is used appropriately at all times. It is okay to use it for non-school activities but these should be in line with the Responsible User Agreement.

NAPLAN tests cancelled for 2020

Education Ministers met today and decided that NAPLAN will not proceed in 2020. The NAPLAN test window was scheduled to be held from 12 to 22 May.

The decision to not proceed with NAPLAN in 2020 has been taken to assist school leaders, teachers and support staff to focus on the wellbeing of students and continuity of education, including potential online and remote learning in light of COVID-19.

This means the scheduled practice tests for students in Years 7 and 9 will not go ahead on Monday 23rd March and normal classes will run.
