Semester Two Reports

At St Mary MacKillop College we recognise the importance of ongoing feedback to students about their academic progress. In light of this we have the Parent Access Module (PAM) where grades for assessment tasks are published and feedback is provided to inform students of their achievements and areas for improvement. We encourage students and parents to access PAM on a regular basis and to have conversations at home around their child's academic progress. End of Semester reports have almost been completed and will shortly be available online via PAM. I encourage parents and guardians to take the time to discuss the report with your child.

To review detailed feedback on each assessment task, please refer to the individual subject Learning Area, accessible via PAM. Hardcopies of End of Semester reports will only be printed and posted home over the holidays if specifically requested. Please contact the office prior to Wednesday 16th December if you need any assistance accessing reports or if you need your password reset.

If any parent is unable to access their child's report online, or does not receive their specifically requested hardcopy by the beginning of Term 1, 2021, please do not hesitate to contact the Front Office.

All Victorian Government and Catholic schools now must use the Victorian Curriculum F-10 for determining achievement levels for students in Years 7 to 10. Schools are required to report on the achievement of all students including those with disabilities 'without exception'. The Victorian Curriculum achievement graphs contain some significant changes, with an explanation of new terms and codes under each graph. If you have any questions or concerns with the reporting of Victorian Curriculum levels for your child, please contact me.

Please note: Some students who have a Personal Learning Program (PLP) may have an expected achievement level set which differs from their year level in some subjects. This will be explained in more detail at the parent's next PSG meeting with Mrs Sally Op't Hoog (Learning Diversity Leader).

Victorian Curriculum Standards

The scoring range for the Victorian Curriculum for Foundation Level to Level 10 is structured in 0.5 increments which nominally equate to 6 monthly progress within an achievement standard.

Achievement means a teacher locating a student on a continuum of learning for a Learning Area and and/or Capability by making an on-balance, holistic, evidence-based and defensible judgement of assessment evidence gathered during a reporting period.

Progress means representing the growth in learning that has occurred by referencing the last time such achievement standards were reported against for that student in the school.

Typically, by the end of the year students should have achieved the following levels for the Victorian Curriculum as outlined in the table below. When students are at these levels on the continuum they are considered as 'at standard'.

Parents can help their child to reflect on their learning by asking these starting questions:

- What has been the highlight of your learning?
- Have you settled into the classroom learning environment after remote learning?
- Did you try a new learning strategy during our time of remote learning? Did this strategy work and are you still using it?
- Are there any concerns you have regarding your learning progress?
- What has been the most challenging thing for your learning this year?

The Change of Preference Period

This is an extremely important period which allows students to reassess their course preference list and revise their initial application in a way that increases their chance of receiving an offer in January. Some students will receive better results than expected, some will receive exactly what they thought, and others will be disappointed. No matter what, students should use the Change of Preference period.

Remember

It is not the end of the world if you do not receive the ATAR score you were hoping for. There are many different pathways to get you to where you want and to achieve your goals. A lot depends on attitude and passion. Students are encouraged to be proactive and should seek out lots of information. The Change of Preference period is also an opportunity for students to include new courses which they may not have known about or considered when they first submitted their preferences in September.

Useful Hints

- 1. Students should check for new and cancelled courses on www.vtac.edu.au. There may be some courses which have been accredited late and therefore require you to apply directly to the university these courses can be applied for in addition to your 8 courses on your Preference List.
- 2. Once results have been received on 30 December start reassessing your preference list early do not leave it until the last minute. To access Change of Preferences log in to VTAC user account using your VTAC ID and PIN.
- 3. Be realistic with your choices. If you have received an ATAR score of 65 it is unrealistic to aim for a course that has an ATAR requirement of 93.
- 4. Choose only courses in which you would be prepared to accept a place.
- 5. List courses in the order in which you would be prepared to accept a place.
- 6. Make sure you have correct pre-requisites and meet any extra requirements have you sat the UMAT, completed additional forms, attended information sessions and interviews.
- 7. Always check the VTAC codes of all the preferences you are re-entering.
- 8. Do not panic!

Universities and TAFE institutions will have Change of Preference information sessions. Students can get first hand advice about courses. Students can talk to staff about course options, entry requirements, fees and costs and alternate entry pathways. University and TAFE websites have lots of information to support students.

Spotlight on Learning: English

Throughout the year in each newsletter article I have written about all the Learning Areas. Our final Learning Area to be showcased in 2020 is English.

The Victorian Curriculum website outlines a detailed rationale for the study of English:

The study of English is central to the learning and development of all young Australians. It helps create confident communicators, imaginative thinkers and informed citizens. It is through the study of English that individuals learn to analyse, understand, communicate and build relationships with others and with the world around them. The study of English helps young people develop the knowledge and skills needed for education, training and the workplace. It helps them become ethical, thoughtful, informed and active members of society and plays an important part in developing the understanding, attitudes and capabilities of those who will take responsibility for Australia's future.

Recently I came across an interesting slide in a presentation on 'The Learning Exchange' website from Dr Lyn Sharratt that talks about the attributes of a literate graduate:

- Writes with purpose and clarity
- Communicates effectively using visual text forms
- Reads for purpose and pleasure
- Thinks critically
- Locates and accesses information from a variety of sources
- Uses oral communication appropriate to purpose and audience
- Problem solving
- Read and interprets visual text forms



Our amazing team of passionate and dedicated English teachers ensure our students develop these skills in the programs that are delivered across each year level. The rationale for English on the Victorian Curriculum website says 'English also helps students to engage imaginatively and critically with literature to expand the scope of their experience'. This year when I have been walking around the school and into different classes, I have seen students engaging imaginatively in their study of English. I recall one junior class was designing a new cover for the book they were studying, and writing an alternative ending to the book.

English is compulsory in the VCE, and other than the GAT, the longest exam our senior students sit is the English exam in November. This exam has three sections: analytical interpretation of a text, comparative analysis of texts, and argument and persuasive language. Our teachers ensure the skills to successfully complete these three sections of the exam are developed from the junior secondary years.

We also offer Literature to our VCE students. What stands out for me when I read the rationale in the Study Design for Literature is students will 'consider the power and complexity of language'. The Literature Study Design also encourages students to be independent, innovative and creative. These are important skills that are transferable across subjects.

We are committed to literacy and throughout 2021 we will continue to implement various initiatives to ensure our students develop their literacy skills.

On Thursday 3rd December the International Day of People with Disability was observed. On this day we celebrate the contributions and achievements of 4.4 million Australians with a disability. As schools we have an important role to play to ensure our students have equal opportunities to reach their full potential.

Australia lifts its performance on global mathematics and science test

New results from the world's longest running large-scale international assessment of mathematics and science, released on 8 December, show Australia has significantly improved its achievement in Year 8 mathematics and science. Change of Preference (CoP)

Whilst the release of results can provide excitement and clarity, some students will be left with questions about what they will study in 2021. Their ATAR may be lower than expected and options may need to be re-evaluated. Stay focused on your dream course and perhaps consider diploma or pathway programs, or courses with lower ATARs as a pathway. Don't forget you may also be eligible for consideration through SEAS. Students are able to add, remove or reorder course preferences through their VTAC account. Watch this video that will guide you through the process.

Year 10 Work Experience Program 2021

All Year 10 students will be given an opportunity to participate in the Work Experience Program where they are able to do a five day placement in an industry of their choice. Work Experience placements provide students with a chance to explore possible career options, and assist them in future course and career decision making.

Each Year 10 core group will have a designated week in 2021 to undertake a placement - 10A (Term 1), 10B (Term 2) and 10C (Term 3). Consideration will be given to specific placement availability at other times during the year. 
YEAR 7 & 8 ACTIVITIES WEEK

They are a wonderful group of students and we look forward to them commencing with us next year.




















DESIGN COMMUNICATION

















PRESENTATION NIGHT
